Yes, it is practical work that we do, but we are still dependent on His guidance and strength for each day. That is also why we are so thankful for the people and churches that stand behind us in prayer.

The last months we have been able to work on some special projects.

In February we got pictures form the Neesim School in Ghana. We had the privilege to work together with Project Share Nederland and organize 10 computer systems for them. We tested all the computers and installed software and packed them in boxes. It is very nice to see pictures of the students using the computers after they arrived in Ghana safely.

A lot of work has also been done in the garage. Besides the usual maintenance on the 16 loan cars for missionaries, Randy had the possibility to organize a car for a Dutch worker for Child Evangelism Fellowship.

Another special story – God knows what we need, before we do: A missionary living in the Netherlands with a big family had an accident with their car. Somebody ran into the

back of it and it was totaled. They needed a solution for transport right away, since the father had a mission trip planned to South America and the mother needed the car to take their child to doctors appointments. Just before this all happened somebody wanted to give the mission their used car and it was the right size for this family. It was a blessing to this family that we could pass this car on to them.

What started as a normal work day, changed when Paul became dizzy. The doctor called an ambulance, but when the ambulance was at the mission everything was fine again. So, we got the advice to go to the hospital for more research. On the way there the situation worsened and, in the hospital, they decided to keep Paul there for 24 hours to observe the situation. He had a CT scan of his head and they gave him a blood thinner. During the next 72 hours his health deteriorated. Until the point that he could not walk. His right leg could not hold him. Also his right arm and hand where paralyzed.

Thankfully after these first 3 days his situation stabilized and the hospital started looking for a cause. At the same time, they started with rehabilitation. After Paul was in the hospital for a week he could move around again in wheelchair. Soon after that he could walk with a guad cane, that he now doesn't need anymore. Paul spent two weeks in the hospital in Dordrecht, before a place became available for him in rehabilitation center Rotterdam. That is where he is now, working with training and therapy to get his leg, arm and hand working again.

We are very thankful for the many encouraging messages we have received. Even though these times can be difficult we know that we are in the Lords hands and he is helping us through. We are seeing improvements very

slowly although the barely moving right hand is still very concerning. The plan is for Paul to come back to work at the mission, but at the moment he is concentrating on his rehabilitation. He does help out with some things for the mission, but rehab is his priority at the moment.

Please pray for me (Ruth) and Randy and Peter as we, with the help of the team, keep the work in Strijen moving along. We can't do this without our Heavenly Father and are dependent on Him.
